- GIVE UP suspicion to FEAST on truth.
- GIVE UP thoughts that weaken to FEAST on promises that inspire.
- GIVE UP idle gossip to FEAST on silence with a purpose.

On March 20 it will be my privilege to attend the Vicariate IV Youth Leadership Awards Banquet as three of our parishioners who are juniors or seniors in high school will be honored for their ministry of *Prayer and Worship* at Saint Hugh Parish. Saturday March 19 is the last scheduled opportunity to receive the Sacrament of Penance before Easter. The Church's Holy Week begins next Sunday.

Lent ends and the Paschal Triduum (three days) begins with the evening Mass on Holy Thursday.

Because of the importance of these three days, only the Triduum services are permitted. There will be no morning

Masses, funerals, confessions, or other rites celebrated. The schedule that follows is intended to serve as both an invitation and a reminder to keep holy these days.

Holy Thursday, March 24: Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7:00pm (presentation of the oils blessed at the Chrism Mass, foot washing, and Eucharistic procession to the altar of repose); Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament until 9:00pm.

Good Friday, March 25: Celebration of the Lord's Passion at 3:00pm (adoration of the cross and Holy Communion); Deacon Frank Mamolella will lead a *Tenebrae* (Latin = *darkness*) Service at 7:00pm.

Holy Saturday, March 26: Blessing of food and baskets at 1:00pm; Easter Vigil Mass at 7:00pm (Light Service, Liturgies of Word, Baptism, and Eucharist).

Easter Sunday, March 27: On this Solemnity of the Resurrection of the Lord parish Masses will be celebrated at 8:00 and 10:30am

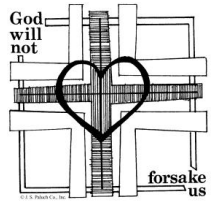

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



How fitting that the first Sunday Angelus of Pope Francis, who has made mercy his papacy's theme, took place the last time today's Gospel about Jesus' encounter with the adulterous woman was proclaimed. "Jesus' attitude is striking," Francis declared. "We do not hear words of scorn or condemnation, only words of love, of mercy, an invitation to conversion: 'Neither do I condemn you' " (John 8:11). Francis continued: "God's face is the face of a merciful father who is always patient. Have you thought about God's patience, the patience [God] has with each one of us? That is [God's] mercy. [God] always has patience, patience with us . . . understands us . . . waits for us . . . does not tire of forgiving us" if we return 'with a contrite heart' (Pope Francis, Angelus address, March 17, 2013). Parishes preparing catechumens may

proclaim Jesus' raising of Lazarus. Referring to Lazarus, and all those "raised" from the "death" of sin, Jesus defines the community's "mission of mercy"-- "Untie him and let him go" (John 11:44). - Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

Confiteor by Paul Turner

Near the beginning of Mass, the community acknowledges its sinfulness and dependence on God's mercy. One option is for all to recite the Confiteor, the prayer that begins, "I confess to almighty God." As people admit their sin, they strike their breast.

The Confiteor is an old prayer, but its current placement in the Mass is an innovation. Prior to the Second Vatican Council, the priest recited the Confiteor by himself, one of several prayers at the foot of the altar that introduced the Mass, and the servers repeated it after him. The people prayed the Confiteor later, just before receiving communion. This was because for many years, people did not receive communion at Mass frequently. When they received communion outside of Mass—for example, when they were sick—they said the Confiteor first. As communion at Mass became more common, the Confiteor came with it. So essentially, a communion service had been inserted into the priest's Mass, as if the people's communion had nothing to do with the priest's communion or the sacrifice preceding it. The priest even distributed communion from the tabernacle rather than the newly consecrated bread and wine on the altar.

In the revisions of the Mass following the Council, the Confiteor became one of three options for the penitential act near the beginning of Mass. The Confiteor was removed from the communion rite, where it interrupted the natural flow of events. It remained at the beginning, but as one option rather than an obligatory prayer. It was offered to the entire assembly to recite rather than to the priest alone. This enabled everyone to participate in the Mass from the very start as the priestly people. One way people participate consciously is to acknowledge to one another and to God that they have sinned, to say aloud, "I confess."

Treasures from the tradition

Three years ago, as we made the shift in the Eucharistic Prayer from "Benedic" to "Francis," we named a "treasure" in our tradition. From apostolic times, the Church has sent disciples on mission with a mandate to proclaim the gospel. Paul and Barnabas and Timothy come to mind as men invested with responsibility for community and mission. First we see bishops, "overseers," good men appointed by the acclaim of their people, the center of leadership, of prayer, of word and sacrament. Their territories were small initially, small enough to get everyone into one room and for the bishop to know everyone's name.

In time, men were appointed to function as a council of advisers, "elders," or presbyters. That isn't a comment on chronological age, rather it indicates the maturity of their wisdom and faith. Before long, and only when the bishop was absent, some of these men "stood in" for him to do what bishops usually did: preaching, presiding at Eucharist. The deacons had a strong and visible role in liturgy and service, especially in the care of the poor, but were gradually overshadowed by the new importance of the presbyter. As the Roman Empire first tottered and then collapsed completely by 476, bishops increasingly became civil servants to maintain order and dispense justice. Conferences and duties summoned bishops away from their home posts, and presbyters were entrusted with the sacramental and preaching duties, even though at one time runners were sent out from the bishop's Mass to bring fragments of the host to drop into chalices as a sign of the church's unity around its bishop.
