

From the Pastor's Desk

Today, with palms, we begin our Holy Week.

As part of the Holy Week rituals, Archbishop Blase J. Cupich will celebrate the Chrism Mass at Holy Name Cathedral on Tuesday March 22 and bless the oils used throughout the diocese during the coming year. The three oils are:

- Oil of the Catechumens - used to anoint those preparing for Baptism.
- Oil of the Sick - used to anoint those who are suffering from illness.
- Sacred Chrism - used to anoint during Baptism, Confirmation and Ordination and to consecrate a new altar.

Lent ends and the Paschal Triduum (three days) begins with the evening Mass on Holy Thursday.

Because of the importance of these three days, only the Triduum services are permitted. There will be no morning Masses, funerals, confessions, or other rites celebrated. The schedule that follows is intended to serve as both an invitation and a reminder to keep holy these days.

March 24: Holy Thursday of the Lord's Supper

7:00pm - Mass of the Lord's Supper (includes the presentation of the oils blessed at the Chrism Mass, foot washing, and Eucharistic procession to the altar of repose). Following Mass we will have adoration of the Blessed Sacrament until 9:00pm.

There is a custom of visiting other Catholic worship sites with adoration on Holy Thursday. If you plan to do so, I suggest that you call ahead or visit their websites to learn their hours.

March 25: Friday of the Passion of the Lord (Good Friday)

3:00pm - Celebration of the Lord's Passion (includes Adoration of the Holy Cross and Holy Communion)

7:00pm *Tenebrae* (Latin = *darkness*) Service led by deacon

March 26: Holy Saturday / The Easter Vigil in the Holy Night

1:00pm -Blessing of food and baskets

7:00pm - Easter Vigil Mass (includes Light Service, Liturgies of Word, Baptism, and Eucharist).

March 27: Easter Sunday of the Resurrection of the Lord

On this Solemnity of the Resurrection of the Lord parish Masses will be celebrated at 8:00 and 10:30am

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

- After Mass: Return two copies of *Breaking Bread* to each book rack. Return the Order of Service card to the hat clip with the word WELCOME being the first thing that the next person will see. Put the kneelers up so that it is easier for the next person to enter. Remove whatever you have brought into the pew including the bulletin, tissues, diapers, papers, and water bottles. Smile.

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



Misericordiae Vultus: The Face of Mercy is Pope
Francis' official decree announcing this Jubilee Year of
Mercy. But Francis had already declared that Jesus
"has shown the face of God's mercy" back in 2013 on
his first Palm Sunday as pope. Francis described Luke's
account of Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem: "Crowds,
celebrating, praise, blessing, peace: joy fills the air.
Jesus has awakened great hopes, especially in the
hearts of the simple, the humble, the poor, the
forgotten, those who do not matter in the eyes of the
world. He understands human sufferings . . . has bent
down to heal body and soul." Entering Jerusalem, Jesus
looks at all of us with love, Francis continued, at our
sicknesses and sins. "A beautiful scene, full of light--the
light of the love of Jesus" (Pope Francis, Palm Sunday
homily, March 24, 2013). May this Jubilee Year's Holy

Week and Triduum make us Jesus' own light-bearers and love-givers to all who

The Catholic faithful use palm branches at Mass on Palm Sunday and bring them home for devotional purposes. Palm Sunday is the popular name for the Sunday before Easter, though its full title is Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion. Two Gospel passages are proclaimed at Mass that day: One tells of people waving

branches or spreading cloaks to welcome Jesus in triumph to Jerusalem, and the other tells of his passion and death.

Any branches may be used in the liturgy, but parishes usually provide palm branches, as mentioned in John's gospel (12:13). The faithful hold them at the beginning of the Mass for the blessing and procession.

After Mass, people may bring the branches home as a sacramental. Various customs have developed. Some place branches behind a wall-mounted crucifix or other religious image. Others cleverly fold them into crosses. Still others incorporate blessed branches into improvised prayers for protection during harmful weather.

Used palm branches are burned the following year, and the ashes are placed on the heads of the faithful on Ash Wednesday. Some parishes burn their own ashes. People who wish to dispose of old palm branches may offer them back for burning or dispose of them at home in some reverent manner.

Palm branches appear in religious art as a symbol of martyrdom. In the Book of Revelation (7:9), a great multitude praises God with palm branches in hand. In the apocryphal gospel of pseudo-Matthew (20-21), a palm tree miraculously bends over to nourish the Holy Family on the flight into Egypt, and an angel plants one of its branches in paradise, making the palm a sign of victory in any contest.

Treasures from the tradition

What day is today? Ask most folks strolling home from church today and they will reply "Palm Sunday." Not too long ago, today was known as the "Second Sunday of the Passion," and in 1970 it was renamed "Passion Sunday." This made some sense, since the procession recalling Christ's entry into Jerusalem is usually only celebrated once in a parish on this day, but the Passion is proclaimed solemnly at every liturgy. In its most recent incarnation, the name for this day includes both aspects of the celebration: "Palm Sunday of the Passion of the Lord." In the United States today, most worshipers are provided with palm branches, although in northern Europe pussy willows are favored, and in Italy olive branches are the norm.

When our calendar was reformed, the entire structure of the week to come was revised even as the traditional name, "Holy Week," was retained. The major benefit of the restructuring of our calendar is to help us see that the Triduum, the great three days beginning at sunset this Thursday and extending until sunset on Easter Sunday, is at the heart of the Christian life.

Today, as you ponder the Lord's Passion, you may consider your response to so great a gift. Centuries ago, good Christians vowed to go on pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Today, at least once in your lifetime, promise to participate faithfully in the liturgies. Now begins the Church's annual baptismal retreat: don't be left out!
