From the Pastor's Desk

ALLELUIA

Blessings and joy throughout this resurrection season. Today, on the Sixth Sunday of Easter, we welcome twenty of our parishioners to the Eucharistic Banquet. Congratulations to our First Communicants (see bulletin cover) and their families. Thank you to all, catechists and liturgical ministers, who have made possible this happy event for our parish.

The month of May is traditionally dedicated to Mary. May is considered the season of the beginning of new life. Related to the medieval practice of expelling winter, May 1 is considered the beginning of growth. Since medieval times, we have had the combination of Mary and the month of May. Prior to Vatican II, May crowning became popular in the United States. A statue of Mary is honored with a wreath of blossoms to indicate Mary's virtues, virtues that were to be imitated by the faithful. The ceremony usually takes place in the context of a public parish devotion outside of the liturgy. Our parish May Crowning will be at 9:30am on Sunday May 8.

Next weekend, in addition to the May Crowning and the Mothers' Day national holiday, we will liturgically celebrate the Ascension of the Lord. Since 1999, most of the dioceses in the United States including the Archdiocese of Chicago, transferred the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord from Thursday (forty days after Easter) to the Seventh Sunday of Easter.

Easter concludes with Pentecost, the birthday of the Church, on May 15. At the 10:30am Mass that Sunday we will most fittingly welcome the Most Rev.

Andrew P. Wypych, an Auxiliary Bishop of the Archdiocese of Chicago, to administer the Sacrament of Confirmation to sixteen of our parishioners. Kindly remember in your prayers our *Confirmandi*, their parents, godparents, sponsors, and catechists.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

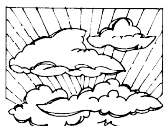

Question of the week

How am I being challenged to imitate the unconditional forgiveness of Jesus, God's "mercy made flesh"?

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



In formal documents, presentations, and homilies outlining the purpose of this Jubilee Year of Mercy, Pope Francis explains that compassion and understanding for those in difficult situations is not only our individual responsibility, but something the whole Church officially needs to manifest. Today's Acts of the Apostles reading presents a moving example of the early church doing precisely that. Prayerful openness to the Holy Spirit assures the assembly that they have not acted alone in discerning the correct resolution: "It is the decision of the Holy Spirit and of us." And they have chosen the compassionate response: "not to place on you any burden beyond these necessities" (Acts 15:28). Yet how daringly creative--the Jewish majority sets aside lifelong rituals that establish spiritual identity and express covenant fidelity. How radically trustful--

Hail Mary by Paul Turner

The Hail Mary is probably the most popular prayer known by Catholics outside the Mass. It forms part of the rosary, the Angelus, night prayer, and certain otherwise hopeless situations involving a football.

It took us hundreds of years to write the Hail Mary. The first part came easy. It draws from the angel Gabriel's annunciation to Mary, that she would give birth to Jesus:

"Hail, full of grace, the Lord is with you" (Lk 1:28). When Mary visited Elizabeth, pregnant with John the Baptist, Elizabeth greeted her with the next phrase we use in the prayer, "Blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb" (Lk 1:42). Over a period of centuries Catholics combined these two greetings of Mary and made them our own, figuring if Gabriel and Elizabeth could get Mary's attention this way, maybe we could too. We strung these greetings together with our own prayer for Mary's intercession. Part scripture, part tradition, the Hail Mary runs deep in Catholic spirituality.

Two popular prayer forms use the Hail Mary: the rosary and the Angelus. In the rosary, it serves as a mantra, a repetitive sequence of words, thoughts and rhythms that draw the believer into a prayerful trance before the mysteries of our salvation. In the Angelus it reminds the faithful three times a day of the incarnation, the Word of God becoming flesh.

In liturgical prayer, the Hail Mary has never staked out territory in the Mass. The Scripture quotations it borrows from Luke's Gospel do occur at Mass as antiphons and responses on feasts of Mary, but we usually substitute a hymn to Mary in their place. However, among liturgical prayers, we find the Hail Mary at the one we call "night prayer." The liturgy of the hours is the official Catholic prayer form marking the principal hours of the day: morning, daytime, evening, and night. The brief service that ends the day concludes with a prayer to Mary. The church offers us several options here, but the most familiar of them is the Hail Mary, the last prayer of the day.

Stewardship thought

Our limited human understanding cannot begin to understand the immense power of God. Instead of trusting in God, we think we can control every outcome. Do you want to make God laugh? Tell Him your plans. The next time worry, anxiety or fear creeps in, thank God for all He has given you and trust He has a better plan for you.

Treasures from the tradition

One ancient Roman custom that was approved by the church was the veiling of the bride. When a single woman pledged her life to Christ, in a way of life not dissimilar to today's religious women, the outward sign of this commitment was a veiling. In ancient Rome, a woman with uncovered head was unmarried, and a veiled woman was "off limits to suitors." It was one small step to decide that a bride should receive a veil from the hands of the church as a sign of her new state in life. The prayer that accompanied the veiling was beautiful, and sung, a kind of consecratory prayer that was very similar to the prayer of ordination, or the prayers for blessing holy water or chrism. The "nuptial blessing" originally mentioned only the woman, although we know that the veil was often extended to cover the husband's shoulders also. The blessing was located before the kiss of peace, which the priest gave to the husband, and the husband to his new bride. Remember that this is in the early centuries, long before the kiss of peace virtually disappeared from liturgy.

The veiling and blessing was required when priests or deacons married, was recommended to laypersons, but forbidden for certain public sinners and second marriages. The veiling of the couple was preserved in England until the Reformation, and is returning to practice among Swedish Lutherans after having fallen into disuse about seventy-five years ago.

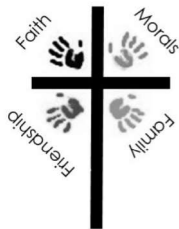
