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From the **Pastor's** Desk

While the liturgical calendar returned to Ordinary Time (think Green) following Pentecost, the two Sundays following the Easter Season are given to so-called feasts of devotion or idea feasts since what we are celebrating is not a specific event in the life of Jesus. Last weekend was the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity; today we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

Pope Urban IV extended the Feast of Corpus Christi to the universal church in 1264. The medieval feast has been combined with the nineteenth century Feast of The Most Precious Blood of Christ (Sanguis Pretiosissimus Christi) to form today's solemnity. In addition to Holy Thursday and First Communions during Easter-time, we welcome this opportunity to reflect on the importance of the Eucharist.

Monday is Memorial Day. The parish office will be closed for this national holiday. All are encourage to prayerfully remember those who have paid the supreme sacrifice while wearing the uniform of our country. Mass on May 30 is at 10:30am.

On the Friday following Corpus Christi, that is nineteen days after Pentecost, we annually celebrate the Feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus. In addition to the feast day of their founder Saint Daniel Comboni on October 10, this year June 3 is an important day for our friends, the Comboni Missionaries of the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The Feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus is also recognized as a World Day of prayer for the sanctification of priests. This practice was established by Pope Saint John Paul II in 2002. In your kindness, pray for holy priests both diocesan and religious.

Next weekend, the first weekend of June, we will recognize, congratulate, and bless our parishioners who are members of the Class of 2016. While commencement, literally a beginning, is about what happens next, the graduation rites also allow a moment to look back and appreciate with gratitude what one has achieved during his or her studies.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



In this Jubilee Year of Mercy, the Lectionary's Year of Luke presents a Gospel in which Jesus, who has welcomed, taught, healed, and shown God's mercy to the multitude, refuses the Twelve's demand to dismiss the crowd before him. Instead, he says, "Give them some food yourselves" (Luke 9:13). In Jesus' hands, what little the Twelve has feeds five thousand ("men," and probably as many women and children), leaving twelve baskets so the Twelve can continue Jesus' ministry of mercy. Pope Francis has asked how we celebrate and live the Eucharist. Do we keep it to ourselves? Or do we "commune" not only with Jesus but with the multitude whom Jesus has given us to cherish? Entrusted to Jesus and shared with others, our limited resources can go a long way. Recognizing Jesus in the Eucharist demands that we recognize Jesus also in the hungry crowd. Adoring Jesus present in the Eucharist

Some of the newest words in the Mass are addressed to
communicants when they hear, "The Blood of Christ."

O Most Catholics grew up receiving communion under one form. Many of them continue this practice although the cup is offered on many more occasions. The presentation of the cup has not yet been received with the enthusiasm reserved for the Sacred Host.

Yet, the General Instruction of the Roman Missal encourages us: "Holy communion has a fuller form as a sign when it takes place under both kinds. For in this form the sign of the Eucharistic banquet is more clearly evident and clear expression is given to the divine will by which the new and eternal Covenant is ratified in the Blood of the Lord, as also the connection between the Eucharistic banquet and the eschatological banquet in the Kingdom of the Father" (281).

At the beginning, of course, sharing the Body and Blood of the Lord was common. Eucharist evolved from the meal traditions of the people. Abstaining from the cup would have been as strange as not taking any drink with the evening meal.

During the middle ages, the sharing of the cup became less frequent. When heretics began denying the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist, devotion became stricter. People gradually felt unworthy to receive communion and left that to the clergy. The fear of spilling the cup, the simplicity of not offering it, and the danger of spreading disease all contributed to the practice of giving communion under one form only when people chose to receive. Because we have always believed Christ was present in the bread as well as the wine, people reasoned they did not need both for the true experience of communion.

However, today we think twice about this minimalism. Although Christ is truly present in either species, a fuller light shines on the eucharistic banquet when we receive both.

When drinking from the cup, first bow, then say "Amen" to the minister, in a sincere tone that reveals your faith in the blood of Christ before you. Then receive the cup with both hands, and take a drink. A good sip. Somewhere between whetting the lips and swallowing hard. Enjoy the full symbol of the eucharistic banquet with reverence and delight.

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Fed by the Lord

Jesus' words "This is my body" and "This cup is the new covenant in my blood" were only part of his table blessing. Jesus twice said: "Do this in remembrance of me" (1 Cor. 11:24,25)

This is the good news of today's solemnity. Like the five thousand hungry souls, we are fed by our Lord. This is not food that satisfies for only a short time, until the next meal. It is food that lasts and changes us. It is food for sharing in much the same way as Melchizedek did when he brought bread and wine to the returning Abraham.

As children of God's reign, we are blessed to be able to receive and share God's gift. And we do so in the way most appropriate to our state in life--as parents, children, husbands, wives, or religious. Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.

Treasures from the tradition

Once the early Christians realized that Christ's coming in glory was delayed, there was a need to provide for the governance and everyday needs of the church. The various "orders" within the church carried forward the apostles' ministry, but also allowed for a measure of creativity. The sacrament we call "holy orders" evolved somewhat slowly. At first, it made sense for Christians to use the forms they knew, adapting them to new situations. Synagogues, for example, were administered by a board of "elders," translated into Greek as presbyteros. We know from the Acts of the Apostles that a system of presbyters was a normal feature of church life from earliest days. They stood in relationship to another order, that of "overseers," translated into Greek as episkopos, giving us the English "bishops." The bishop was the shepherd, the faithful tender of the flock, one who offered the Eucharist, forgave sins, and maintained the bond of charity. Just as the deacons were the chief advisers for the charitable life of the church, so were the presbyters meant to advise the bishop on the spiritual life of the faithful. They were trusted advisers at first, not pastors or priests as we understand those terms today. -Rev. James Field, Copyright (c) J. S. Paluch Co.
