From the Pastor's Desk

Today is the Fourteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time and the First Sunday of the new fiscal year.

At our annual Volunteer Appreciation Dinner, I was pleased to announce that during the past year (July 1 - June 30) Saint Hugh Parish celebrated 20 baptisms compared to 14 funerals. Additionally we celebrated 25 First Communions and had 21 Confirmed. We also celebrated one marriage. In the year just completed we added a deacon to our pastoral staff and established a Saint Hugh Conference of the Society of Saint Vincent DePaul. Church attendance, the October Count, grew for the third consecutive year (since moving the Saturday Mass to 4:00pm). Much of the good done by this community of faith is not so easily measured, but for the blessings and graces of the past year, we are most grateful.

Repairs to our gym continue. The new roof was funded through parish savings (major repair - yellow envelopes) while the replacement floor cost is covered by insurance less our deductible. Our office manger, Christine Alfred, has worked with the appropriate offices of the Archdiocese and our Parish Finance Committee in moving this project along.

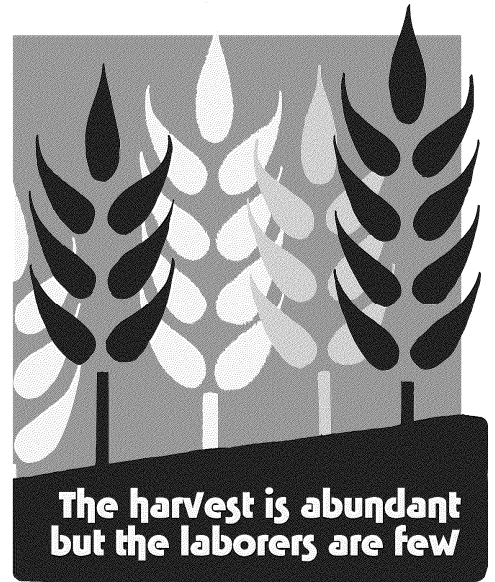
The parish budget for this new fiscal year raises the targeted weekly offering from \$2900 to \$3050; a modest increase of 5% or \$1 more for every \$20 donated. I trust that you will be as generous as possible in your ongoing support of the work and mission of Saint Hugh Parish.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

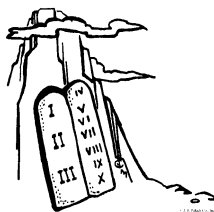

Question of the week

When in my life have I felt God's nurturing care, or God's comforting love embracing me "in God's lap"? To whom must I go this week to share something of the merciful love God has extended to me?

Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



Last Sunday, Jesus rebuked James and John for wanting to "call down fire from heaven" (Luke 9:54-55) on an unwelcoming town. As he sends forth disciples today, Jesus again forbids retaliation against non-receptive listeners (10:10-11), showing us how to be Jesus' "missionaries of mercy" this Jubilee Year of Mercy. Like the first disciples, we are sent not to proclaim ourselves but Jesus. As Jesus sent them in pairs, so are we also to work together in the community of the Church. We often describe the Church as Isaiah describes Jerusalem in today's first reading, our comforting, nurturing Mother (Isaiah 66:13). So, going forth gently, like lambs among wolves (Luke 10:3), we share comforting peace, nurturing food and drink (Luke's image for Eucharist), and Jesus' healing promise of

unfailing, unconditional mercy (10:5, 7, 9). Thus Jesus bids us proclaim the kingdom of God by showing what God's kingdom looks like in action. "Go, preach the Gospel," Pope Francis' saintly namesake of Assisi is said to have instructed his first friars, "and when necessary, use words!"

Saints Peter and Paul by Paul Turner

That Saints Peter and Paul suffered martyrdom under persecutions in Rome is virtually certain. The legends about their death lack historical proof, but they make a great story:

Fire broke out in Rome in 64 A.D. under Nero, the emperor-violinist. Housing and places of amusement were destroyed. The people grew angry at Nero, who blamed the Christians for the blaze and persecuted them. To placate the people in their continuing distress, Nero ordered the death of Christianity's two greatest leaders, Peter and Paul, in the year 67.

When Peter heard about the growing persecutions, he fled Rome. But he saw a vision of Jesus walking back toward the city of Rome. "Where are you going?" Peter asked. ("Quo vadis?") "To Rome, to be crucified again," Jesus mournfully replied. Peter, knowing he had to follow his master, turned about and went back to the city.

On the day of their execution, Peter and Paul met. Paul had been in prison in Rome, under house arrest. Since he was a Roman citizen he avoided the kind of death that awaited Peter—crucifixion in the city. Paul was to be beheaded outside the city walls. On June 29, Peter and Paul embraced on the Ostian Way. Peter marched north toward the public arena; Paul marched south outside the city gate. When Paul was beheaded, his head bounced three times. A spring of water gushed forth at each place. (The monastery of The Three Fountains stands on the site today. The residents make chocolate.) Since the main civic arena had been destroyed in the fire, Peter was crucified in a makeshift location. Claiming he was not worthy to be killed like his master, he was turned upside down on the cross. After he died, his body was buried in a pauper's grave. That grave is the site of the Vatican.

On June 29 we celebrate the apostle of the Jews and the apostle of the Gentiles. Together they brought the message of Christ to the world. So significant is their feast that in some countries it is a holy day of obligation. In the United States, when the feast falls on Sunday, it takes the place of the usual ordinary time liturgy. It helps us celebrate our mission to bring Christ to the world, no matter the cost.

Treasures from the tradition

Some say tomato--and some say tomahto--you know the old song. What do you say when you arrive at church and see a font prepared, a baby in the wings, the paschal candle burning? Well, maybe you will say that "we're having a baptism today," or maybe you say "we are having a christening." The proper term is baptism, since that is the name of the sacrament. But the persistent use of "christening" in our culture, probably from due to the influence of the Episcopal Church, is interesting.

Baptism, an ancient word, is from the Greek meaning to dip or to dunk. Christening is an Old English word that describes perfectly well that more than getting splashed with water, the person being baptized is being "Christ-ed." No matter what you call it, there's always water involved, and then an anointing with chris--fragrant olive oil consecrated as a sign of Christ's presence--poured upon the brow as we say, "As Christ was anointed Priest, Prophet, and King, so may you live always as a member of his body, sharing everlasting life."

So, in being Christ-ed, you are conformed to his image, your life is expected to be a retelling of his life in miniature and you--even though you may be squirming or sleeping--are commissioned to be a priest, a prophet, a king. This means that you are called to be one who worships, you are called to speak the truth, you are called to shape the world and exercise right judgment. That is the deepest treasure of our tradition, and every time you gather to celebrate a baptism, you renew your vows precisely so that you can be more "Christ-ed." No matter what vocabulary you assign to the liturgy, the key is transformation of the human person in the community of the Body of Christ.

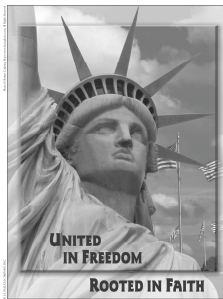
