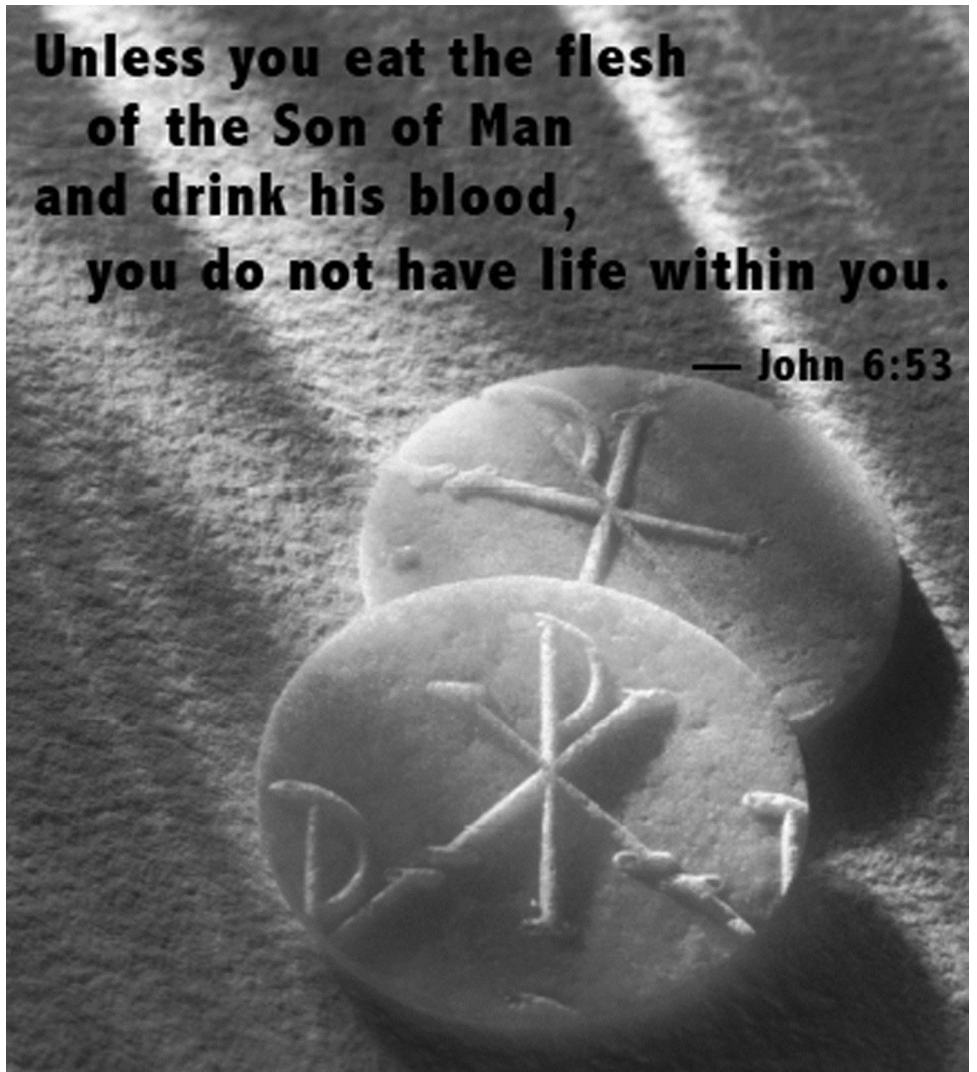

From the Pastor's Desk

Today is the Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time and the fourth of five consecutive Sundays where the Gospel is taken from John 6 - the Bread of Life discourse.

All are invited to the Chicago Pallium Celebration on Sunday August 23 at 2:15pm at Holy Name Cathedral, State and Superior Streets (no tickets required / lines forming at noon). During the opening rites, Archbishop Carlo Maria Viganò, the Papal Nuncio, will invest Archbishop Blase J. Cupich with the Pallium, a sign of his unity with Pope Francis and a symbol of his office as Metropolitan Archbishop. The Archbishop of Chicago is Metropolitan of the Province of Illinois including the dioceses of Joliet, Rockford, Peoria, Springfield, and Belleville. The Pallium is a scarf or stole-like vestment that is worn over the chasuble. It is about two-inches wide and it rests on the shoulders with a pendant or decorative flap in the front and the back. When viewed from the front or the back it resembles the letter 'Y'. The Pallium is white with six black crosses. Three of the crosses are ornamented with a gold pin symbolizing the nails of Christ's crucifixion. Some of the white wool of the Pallium comes from two lambs that are blessed each year by the Pope on January 21 the feast of Saint Agnes. In addition, each of the pendants are tipped with black satin resembling the hoof of a lamb. The imagery represents the Archbishop, the chief shepherd of the diocese, carrying a lamb on his shoulders in imitation of Christ the Good Shepherd. The Pallium was blessed by Pope Francis at the Vatican on June 29 the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul.

Let us continue to pray for one another and for our parish.

NPM Plenum Address

The National Pastoral Musicians (NPM) convention I attended in July had

memorable moments including the daily keynote addresses. Wednesday was no exception. Our speaker had painted many faces of destitute people he had met in the recent year which flashed in the lower right corner of the video screen during his presentation. He named his talk *Joy and Hope, Grief and Anguish: Singing, then Sending*, a reference to *Gaudium et Spes* from Vatican II. The contrasts in the title show how liturgy calls us to change and be more than we think we are.

He began explaining that water was the foundation of the Church. It is "thicker than blood when with the Spirit. We grow from I belong to WE belong." His statements such as, "Dying and rising is our song. The Mass is our home" and "Liturgy transforms us to be people of Justice to make a difference in our world." "The prayers of the faithful (Universal Prayers) are designed to change your heart." He claims he learned to truly pray from Peter in Portland, "Jesus, don't screw me over today," as he put it.

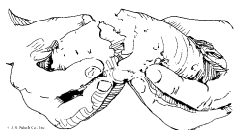
He made a striking suggestion about our solidarity with those who suffer. Labels are always wrong. Remove the word THE in your community. Replace it with OUR, such as OUR poor. Don't blame people for who they are. Encourage life-giving ways: start peace, draw, paint, write poetry, dance, sing, practice the piano and deepen hospitality. Be people of peace and forgiveness. Love endlessly. That's a tall order, but what a difference it would make. I'd like to add – join the choir! (to be continued...)

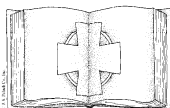

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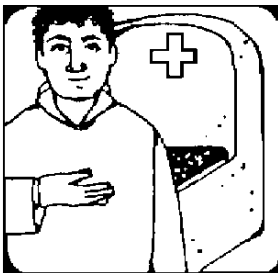

Presider's Chair by Paul Turner

A chair is more than a piece of furniture. It can also symbolize the person who sits there. In many homes a family member has a preferred chair, and others won't sit there out of respect. In offices, in boardrooms and even at the dining room table, some seats are just sacred.

At church the presider's chair is more than a chair. It symbolizes the priest. He doesn't just sit there. He stands there to lead the assembly in prayer. The priest who presides at Mass stands at the chair for the opening rites, sits in the chair for the Scripture readings and may stand at the chair again for the communion prayer and concluding rites. He may also preach from the chair if he wishes.

A typical sanctuary contains three distinct areas designated by furniture: the altar, the ambo, and the chair. The altar gathers us together for the eucharistic prayer, the heart of the Mass. The ambo holds the Scriptures for the Liturgy of the Word. The presider's chair focuses our attention at the beginning and at the end of the service because it establishes the role of one who leads us in prayer.

In the early church, the chair was positioned in the apse behind the altar. When the altar was moved to the back wall, the chair was relocated to one side of the sanctuary, facing the opposite side.

Today the presider faces the assembly from the chair. It may be placed against the back wall. In churches where the tabernacle occupies that space the chair should stand to the side. The presider's chair should not seem too remote from the assembly because the priest is not a performer to be watched but a leader engaged with all those gathered together. Ideally the position and structure of his chair identifies the priest as one with the people, yet also as their

Treasures from our tradition

If the alb is the premier baptismal garment, then why are there so many other styles of vesture in evidence in our parishes? In some places, altar servers and other ministers might wear a garment, usually black, called a cassock. Over that is normally worn a white garment (a "surplice"), reminiscent of the alb but much shorter, often of starched linen and trimmed with lace. The cassock is not a liturgical garment, but a clerical robe. Its origins lie in the religious habit of monks. By the late Middle Ages, diocesan priests and clerics increasingly were encouraged to emulate religious priests. Very small boys were often apprenticed to monasteries, especially for music education, and would be invested with a cassock and sometimes even inducted into the ranks of clerics.

For centuries before the Reformation, it was required that all men entering higher education be clerics, and so the cassock and its variations became familiar academic garb. At the Reformation, many ministers retained a form of the cassock as ordinary dress, rejecting liturgical garments. In the seventeenth century, the English Civil War was in part provoked by the Archbishop of Canterbury's insistence that ministers wear surplices. Although the Episcopal Church now retains "cassock and surplice" as the normal dress for lay men and women assisting at liturgy, Catholics are increasingly attentive to the deeply traditional treasure of the alb, our baptismal robe, when special liturgical vesture is needed.

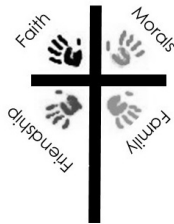
