

Of Musical Note

Funeral Rites: Mourning and Celebration of Resurrection

One of the cherished speakers at the National Pastoral Musicians (NPM)

convention was Kathleen Harmon, SND de N. Since most of us are responsible for the music at the funerals in our parishes, we welcomed her insight and wisdom. She began by asking the question, *What was the most painful funeral you experienced?* Answers ranged from 1) when no one came, 2) suicide, 3) an infant, to 4) an alcoholic. Her goal was to help us help those grieving move through loss to the new life promised by the risen Christ.

People ask, *Is everything going to be all right?* Her answer is that the funeral rite itself is a gift to people. The Mass makes present the person and mystery of Jesus Christ. Its purpose is not to be a memorial of the person who died but a deep expression of hope in God's promise of eternal life. Sister reminded us to reread the introduction to *The Order of Christian Funerals*. I found the following among others: *The Church commends the dead to God's merciful love and pleads for the forgiveness of their sins.* It continues: *The Christian community affirms and expresses the union of the Church on earth with the living and the dead and proclaims its belief that all the faithful will be raised up and reunited.*

She made some practical suggestions for expressive action: 1) have the family put their hands on the casket during the opening prayer, 2) refer to the deceased in the Universal Prayer, 3) have a roster of lectors for funerals, 4) form a bereavement support group to be at hand for several months, 5) start a monthly memorial (not a Mass) to express faith in the risen Christ to help accept the reality of death.

Sister's concluding remarks integrated funerals with the liturgical year. She proposed that we have underplayed the season of Lent and recommended that we walk the passion, abstain from meat and enter into the somberness of the season to enter into Jesus' suffering and death. Her final suggestion was to

frequently spend three minutes reflecting on our own death. The Church calls each member of Christ's Body to participate in the ministry of consolation, to care for the dying, to pray for the dead, to comfort those who mourn.

St. Hugh has a Resurrection Choir who sing our funerals. You are welcome to participate in this beautiful ministry. Please contact me at 708.447.3108 ext 7. This concludes my report on NPM's 2015 convention.

Foster Hospitality

All Are Welcome is not just #418 in the *Breaking Bread* hymnal. It is our sincere aim that all are made to feel welcome at Saint Hugh Parish. Please do what you can to foster this sense of hospitality within our faith community.

- Before Mass:

Greet one another. Introduce yourself. Move toward the center of the pew so that it is easier for others to enter. Silence your phone. Smile.

- During Mass:

Actively participate. Sing. Take the initiative at the sign of peace. Pray with and for each other. Smile.

- After Mass:

Return two copies of *Breaking Bread* to each book rack. Return the Order of Service card to the hat clip with the word WELCOME being the first thing that the next person will see. Put the kneelers up so that it is easier for the next person to enter. Remove whatever you have brought into the pew including the bulletin, tissues, diapers, papers, and water bottles. Smile.






All are welcome immediately after the 10:30am Mass to our Sixth Annual Parish Picnic. We will have games and small prizes for the kids, games inside the air

Eucharistic Prayer Choice

The eucharistic prayers used at Mass are in four categories. The first group, simply numbered one through four, contains the principal prayers for Mass throughout the liturgical year.

A second group is used for masses of reconciliation. The two prayers of this group were originally composed for the holy year 1975 when

Paul VI was pope, but they have been approved for general use, especially in penitential seasons and days when the scriptures invite us to reconcile.

A third group is for Masses with children. These three prayers were originally composed with specific age groups in mind, but they are used interchangeably now for any group of preadolescents. These eucharistic prayers are still lengthy, but they aim to engage children through a simplified vocabulary and the singing of additional acclamations.

The final group is for Masses for various needs and occasions. Masses may be offered for a variety of intentions, such as the church, society, weather, and family. There are four variations of the eucharistic prayer for Masses for various needs and occasions, each with its own preface and intercessions.

Of the first group, Eucharistic Prayer I is recommended on Sundays, solemnities, and feasts of the saints mentioned in the prayer. It is also called the Roman Canon, and it was the only eucharistic prayer used in the Roman rite for many centuries. Prayer II is based on a text from the third or fourth century. It is shorter and recommended for weekdays. Prayer III, newly composed after the Second Vatican Council, is especially fitting for Sundays and feasts. Prayer IV, which tells about salvation history, is especially suited for weekdays and Sundays in Ordinary Time. Its preface never varies.

Treasures from our tradition

The ministry of permanent deacons has become an essential part of our parish life today, yet for centuries until 1967, this deeply traditional ministry had virtually disappeared. Every priest had first to be ordained a deacon, but the notion that one could actually embrace a permanent vocation to the diaconate was lost.

The primary ministry of the deacon is to the welfare of the community, especially its poor, and his role in sacraments and preaching flows from that. His principal role is to animate and promote the ministry of all the faithful. Ninety percent of permanent deacons are married, although the discipline of celibacy for clerics means that if a deacon is widowed, normally he cannot remarry, nor can an unmarried deacon marry once ordained. The deacon does not preside at Mass nor may he absolve sins. Nor, since anointing of the sick is linked theologically to penance, may he anoint.

Sometimes we are slow to engage with a tradition: Trent approved permanent deacons in the 1560s, but nothing was done until the 1960s. The vitality of the long-delayed restoration has greatly enriched the Church, particularly in the United States, where the majority of the deacons in the world serve.


