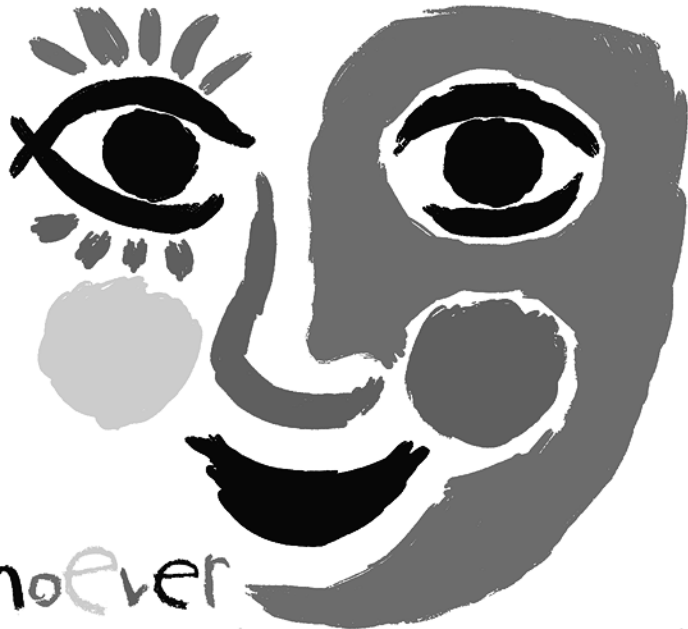

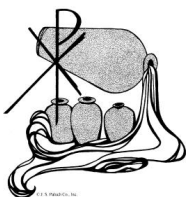

New Saint Junipero Serra

Miguel Jose Serra was born on the island of Majorca on November 24, 1713, and took the name of Junipero when in 1730, he entered the

Franciscan Order. Ordained in 1737, he taught philosophy and theology at the University of Padua until 1749.

At the age of thirty-seven, he landed in Mexico City on January 1, 1750 and spent the rest of his life working for the conversion of the peoples of the New

World.

In 1768, Father Serra took over the missions of the Jesuits (who had been wrongly expelled by the government) in the Mexican province of Lower California and Upper California (modern day California). An indefatigable worker, Serra was in large part responsible for the foundation and spread of the Church on the West Coast of the United States when it was still mission territory.

He founded twenty-one missions and converted thousands of Indians. The converts were taught sound methods of agriculture, cattle raising, and arts and crafts.

Junipero was a dedicated religious and missionary. He was imbued with a penitential spirit and practiced austerity in sleep, eating, and other activities. On August 28, 1784, worn out by his apostolic labors, Father Serra was called to his eternal rest. He was beatified by Pope John Paul II on September 25, 1988. His statue, representing the state of California, is in National Statuary Hall. His feast day is July 1.

This patron of vocations will be canonized a saint by Pope Francis on Wednesday September 25, 2015.

Doing nothing. We yearn for that kind of leisure. But doing nothing can also be one of the hardest jobs we face. Take Mass, for example. The parts of the Mass where we do nothing permit us to be distracted by anxieties over kids, the hair color of a choir member, plot developments in tomorrow's soaps, or the possibility of a pennant race.

Perhaps the chief zoning out period is the eucharistic prayer, that long solo prayer that the presider recites in all-too-familiar tones, which incongruously is the most important prayer in the history of the planet.

When kids object that Mass is boring, they know they've got you on this one. Even chess masters find it challenging to concentrate during a eucharistic prayer.

Understanding the parts of the prayer may help us to pray it better. Of the 10 eucharistic prayers approved for use in the United States, one of the most beautiful is prayer four.

The prayer is structured as most eucharistic prayers are. An opening dialogue between priest and people leads into a preface and concludes with the "Holy." This is followed by a prayer for the Holy Spirit to bless the bread and wine (epiclesis). Then a recounting of the work of Christ precedes the story of the Last Supper. The second half includes an anamnesis, or remembrance, of Christ's activity; the actual offering of the sacrifice; a second prayer for the Holy Spirit (epiclesis), this time to come not over the gifts, but over the people; and the intercessions, or prayers for the members of the church and the world.

What distinguishes prayer four is the long exposition that follows the "Holy." It tells of humanity's place in creation, our need for redemption and the mission of the Son and Spirit.

This prayer also carries its own preface, which praises and describes the mystery of God. You usually hear prayer four more during ordinary time. Seasons like Lent and Easter carry their own prefaces, as do most feasts. These work with other eucharistic prayers but not with Prayer IV.

This prayer loosely adapts one by St. Basil, prayed by our church in the fourth century and still in use in some of the Eastern Rites. When we hear the story of salvation history, we remember also our own history as a church and recognize Christ, whose eternal presence rescues us from all that could keep us from him—including the boredom of doing nothing.

Treasures from our tradition

Toward the end of the second century, a churchman in North Africa, Tertullian, described an early form of penance. Imagine if it had survived! There were three steps to this very public ritual. The unfortunate sinner was brought before the community in an itchy garment of goat's hair. The communities of the day were small and intimate, and everyone knew everyone else. The shame of exposure for a big sin—murder, idolatry, or adultery—would have been profound. The penitent would beg the community for prayers of intercession, and then go sit in a place assigned to penitents. After this public confession, the penitent would be assigned some discipline, usually a relatively severe fast, or the wearing of distinctive garb. This remedy for sin was for a certain period of time, or at least until the bishop (every small community has its own bishop) judged that enough was enough. Then the person would be readmitted to the eucharistic community, although Tertullian doesn't tell us how. Probably the bishop tenderly placed his hands on their heads, precisely where they were anointed at baptism. We do know that the readmission of penitents to the eucharistic table became in some churches a great celebration, and there are records from Spain of bishops leading penitents in a dance-like processional into the eucharistic hall on Holy Thursday.

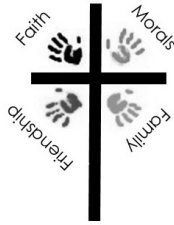
