

Last year, in speaking to a conference in Rome, Pope Francis reminded the participants that "the vocation to the priesthood is a gift that



God gives to some for the good of all."
This weekend as we celebrate and pray
for our own seminarians in the Archdiocese
of Chicago, I ask you once again for your
financial support of them.

We currently have sixty-seven seminarians preparing for a life of service as your future pastors. Their motivation and enthusiasm for serving in the Church through a life-long commitment is inspiring to us all, promoting us to offer in return our prayers, fraternal encouragement and financial support. Many of you have personally told me how much you enjoy meeting our seminarians whenever they visit parishes and I know you come away from those experiences with a renewed sense of hope for the future.

We in turn as a community need to stand with them during their years of preparation and for this reason I invite you to join with me in making this year's seminarian collection a great success. Jubilee of Mercy: December 8, 2015 - November 20, 2016



Amos castigates religious people who, "comfortably complacent" (6:1, 5), ignore the unfolding collapse of culture, nation, religion (6:6). In Jesus' parable, such complacency becomes the rich man's undoing. He neither hurt nor harmed Lazarus, neither denied him leftovers nor ordered him removed. That is Jesus' devastating point. The rich man did nothing wrong to Lazarus; he just did nothing at all good for him. Only in death, separated by "a great chasm" (Luke 16:26), could the rich man finally see Lazarus, whom he had failed to see in life, right before his eyes. Like the rich man's "five brothers still in my father's house" (16:27-28), we who are alive in the Church still have time to see that same Someone, Jesus, lying neglected right at our door--and time to do something. Who, specifically, concretely, practically, is

Lazarus in my life? What can I do for that Jesus-in-the-flesh during this Jubilee Year of Mercy? - Peter Scagnelli, Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co., Inc.

Stewardship thought

My child, remember that you received what was good during your lifetime while Lazarus likewise received what was bad; but now he is comforted here, whereas you are tormented. Moreover, between us and you a great chasm is established... LUKE 16:25-26

When God created the world He declared that it was good and He gave it to **all** mankind for us to enjoy. However, over the years we have created a chasm between those who have great gifts and those who do not. In today's Gospel we see that with our own generosity we must bridge that gap between those who have much and those who have little or we may find ourselves on the wrong side of the chasm in the next life.

Last Rites by Paul Turner

If you've witnessed the anointing of the sick lately, you know anointing ain't what it used to be. In the old days, if the priest arrived for the anointing, or "extreme unction," or "last rites," you knew your hours were numbered.

Today the sacrament is no longer reserved for the dying. In fact, you can make a case that the dying should not be anointed at all. You can have "last rites" without a priest.

The rite of anointing is part of a book called *Pastoral Care of the Sick*. "Extreme unction" means "last anointing," and that term has been discontinued in favor of a broader term - the pastoral care of the sick.

The document says, "Great care and concern should be taken to see that those of the faithful whose health is seriously impaired by sickness or old age receive this sacrament. The sacrament may be repeated if the sick person recovers after being anointed and then again falls ill or if during the same illness the person's condition becomes more serious. A sick person may be anointed before surgery whenever a serious illness is the reason for the surgery. Elderly people may be anointed if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present."

In short, anointing prays for recovery. If you're gravely sick, the time has come to anoint. If you're dying, however, we have a separate ritual called "Commendation of the Dying." It does not include the anointing of the sick. However, the rites for the dying should include another sacrament—communion given as "viaticum," or "food for the journey." The sacrament of the dying is "last communion," and it may be offered by any communion minister.

After someone dies, we offer "Prayers for the Dead." Again, they do not include an anointing. Among the requirements to celebrate the sacraments in the Catholic church is to be a living, breathing, human being. After you've died, you don't need sacraments any more—you've got the real thing.

At your parish church, you probably only witness the anointing of the sick and not the rites for the dying—since pastoral care of the dying is generally offered in hospitals and homes. You might call all the prayers for the dying "last rites," and a priest need not be present for them. The church gladly offers its pastoral care as freely as it can.

Treasures from the tradition

We've been thinking about names lately, and there is hardly any tradition older than changing one's name when accepting a new vocation in life. In the time of Jesus, people would normally wait until the eighth day after birth for the naming of a child, partly because of the fragility of infant life, when the eighth day would mark the end of a survival crisis, and also because the elders would look for some clues as to the child's identity. In Jewish life then as now, it was not the custom to name a child after a living parent; notice there are no "juniors" in the genealogy of Jesus. Remember also how the relatives complained to Zachary and Elizabeth that no one in their family was ever named John. Then there are the changed names, Abram became Abraham, Sarai became Sarah, Saul became Paul, Simon became Peter. This spills over into Western culture in many ways, such as British royalty taking new names at coronation. It's anybody's guess, for example, whether the Prince of Wales intends to be King Charles II, or become Henry, or Edward, or George if he wishes.

Members of religious orders have until recent years swapped baptismal names for new ones, and the latest pope made a switch as well. Secular life has many parallels, and movie stars like Cary Grant, Judy Garland, and John Wayne might not have shone so brightly as Archie Leach, Frances Gumm, and Marion Morrison. There are some compelling reasons in our tradition for taking a new name when undertaking a new mission, yet also a clear preference for choosing the right baptismal name from the start!




