This week students will need to turn in two blue sheets: November 1st for All Saints' Day, and Sunday, November 5th. During the month of November, we continue to remember and pray for those who have died. This is a simple prayer you can pray:

Eternal rest grant unto them, O Lord. And let the perpetual light shine upon them. And may the souls of all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace. Amen.

Look what our kids are doing! This year we challenged our Wednesday Confirmation students to dig a little deeper on their weekly blue sheets and answer a "Confirmation challenge question". We've been so impressed by their deep, thoughtful responses; we wanted to share with you.

*These readings are based upon Sundays' Gospels: Oct 1, 2017: How do you think Jesus would be accepted if he said this today?

In this day and age everyone's opinion is so free and I think people have lost the type of respect that used to be given back when Jesus lived on Earth. So they would probably criticize them even worse.

Oct 15, 2017: Do you feel Jesus' words were too strong? The people were given sufficient time to be invited/prepared. How would you reply if you were the bridegroom? (remember, the wedding feast is an analogy for heaven.)

They are strong because he wants to make a point. The bridegroom would probably be hurt because they won't be part of something special. As God says, many are invited but only those that are worthy will be chosen.

No, I don't because if we are not ready for heaven we will be cast into the fires. I would be scared that I am not prepared to enter heaven.

Oct 22, 2017: In our modern culture, how have you witnessed or experienced people, media, etc. trying to mix up Jesus/the Church's teachings? How do you respond? Have you been challenged to defend the faith?

So many people don't have a God to worship so they don't know any better than to ask us why <u>we</u> do. I always answer, "Look around, people can't create a planet. They can't create stars or the sky or the moons." Sometimes they worship false gods. This is the only way I'm challenged. I don't know what to do or say to them. I just learn to respect them and not judge people based on who they believe made us. We were all created by God even though some people don't think so.

Yes, I have witnessed this. I usually correct their mistake and move on. When challenged in my faith, I pray for guidance.

A celebrity (Miley Cyrus) has mixed up Christ's teachings before and was praised for doing so. She would do outrageous things and commit sin, yet use the phrase, "only god can judge me," as an excuse. While the phrase itself isn't wrong, it is also not to promote sinful actions. Everyone is supposed to praise God. Yet since it was at such a large scale I didn't do anything. Other than that I haven't had to defend my faith.

Keep up the great work, kids!

LITURGY CORNER

Why is the Baptismal Font located at the entrance to the church? It is customary as we enter any Catholic church to dip our hand into the font containing Holy Water. As we dip our hand and make the Sign of the Cross with the Holy Water, we remember our Baptism as well as acknowledging the presence of Jesus in the Tabernacle. Just as the Sacrament of Baptism brings us into the Church, our remembrance brings us into the church. The Font is a symbol of both tomb and womb with its power, the power of the triumphant Cross. Baptism sets us as Christians onto the path to life that will never end. Having the Baptismal Font at the entrance and as the waters from which we bless ourselves, we more visually remember and celebrate our Baptism. Initiation into the Church is entrance into a Eucharistic community united in Jesus. Water is the key symbol of Baptism and the focal point of the Font. In this water we as believers die to sin and are reborn to new life in Jesus. We are bornagain Christians every time we dip our hand into the waters of Baptism. Our conversion is ongoing as we grow in our faith. The Baptismal Font, visible and available as we enter the church, also reminds us of our full initiation through Confirmation and Eucharist, that marriage and ordination are ways of living the life of faith begun in Baptism, that the funeral of a Christian is the final journey of a life in Jesus that began in Baptism, and that through the Sacrament of Penance we are called to conversion and to a renewal of our Baptismal commitment. Having the Baptismal Font near the entrance and setting it on an axis with the Altar (note that the Font is in direct line with the Altar) symbolizes the relationship between the Sacraments as well as the importance of the Eucharist within our life and our faith development. What a wonderful way for you and your family to experience the blessings of Advent!

And, just in case you are not familiar with the traditional Posada, here is some fascinating background:

"December is a month in which most families and friends come together to celebrate, eat, drink, and enjoy the closing of a year. But to most Christians who celebrate the traditional Posadas, December is not only a month of communal gathering but it is also a month of spiritual religious services, singing, and candlelight walks. The actual origins of the Posadas is unclear, but scholars have, in fact, discovered that Aztecs by ancestral custom celebrated rituals in honor of Huitzilopochtli during this time of the year. The interesting thing is that, by the second half of the sixteenth century, the Augustine monks began to incorporate these ancestral rituals into the celebration of the coming of Jesus, the Savior. Furthermore, several scholars have acknowledged that Saint John of the Cross added the singing and the knocking on doors to the celebration of Christmas, thus developing the tradition of Las Posadas.

"Those are some historical facts about Las Posadas, but in order to get the complete taste of the festive yet spiritual posada, one needs to understand that Las Posadas are symbolic, taking the word posada literally. For instance, Las Posadas comes from the root word posada which mean, to ask for shelter. The tradition of the Posadas is based on the idea that people can have the opportunity to experience the hardships Joseph and Mary had to endure. It can also be considered a re-enactment of Mary and Joseph's arduous search for shelter. The Posadas, with the assistance of the mystic Saint John of the Cross, have retained this sixteenth century flavor in modern times. People today gather together with a particular group of friends and families for nine days, visiting each others homes; "los santos peregrinos" sing from the outside for shelter while innkeepers, the people inside, respond with a rejection. On the last day of the NOVENA, the community asking for Posada, finally, is able to find a family that invites them in, and the celebration begins."
