The Story of Telemacus (pronounced: tell-a-mock-us)

In the year 325 A.D., Emperor Constantine was involved in a civil war. He had a vision of the Christian Cross as the means to victory. He had the Christian Cross placed on the shields of all his soldiers, and he was victorious in battle and became the Emperor of Rome. Constantine became a Christian and exact of Milen. grapting religious taleranes to Christian Cross as the means a christian and exact of Milen.

Christian and enacted the edict of Milan, granting religious tolerance to Christians. Constantine also prohibited the blood sport of gladiator fights. However, the sport of gladiator fights was so engrained in the society of that time that it persisted on and off throughout the years.

In the year 404 A.D. there was a great celebration in Rome after the defeat of the Goths. There was also an Asian monk named Telemacus, who while in his monastery fasting and praying received a vision telling him to go to Rome. Telemacus went to Rome, and became aware of the gladiators fighting in the colosseum. He was appalled at the brutality of men killing each other in the arena, and the barbarism of the crowds sitting safely in their seats cheering to encourage the men to kill one another. Telemacus went down and jumped over the arena wall and placed himself between the fighting gladiators, shouting: "In the Name of Jesus, stop!" He continued to shout "In the Name of Jesus, stop." The crowd quieted down, but when they perceived what he was doing, they began to boo him, and pelt him with stones. Telemacus was slain in the arena.

But then something happened. It is said that the crowd again was silenced as they looked upon the dead body of this monk, and then one by one, they began to leave the colosseum. Even the gladiators put down their weapons and left. Emperor Honorius was furious at the lynching of the monk and closed all of the arenas. I read a number of accounts of Telemacus, each having slightly different aspects in the telling of the event. The above is a summary of the event. It is not clear whether Telemacus was stoned, slain by the sword or both, but it is clear that Telemacus gave his life that day in the arena telling people to stop the evil in The Name of Jesus.

To what level and degree have we converted our lives to Jesus? Are we willing to stand up and stop the injustice of evil when we perceive dishonesty, intolerance, abuse, violence, or any evil of injustice in whatever form it comes? And if we have enough of the Holy Spirit to know God's Truth and Justice, do we have the courage and strength to respond? And if we respond, then how are we going to stop injustice? Do we have enough Faith, Hope and Love to speak and act in The Name of Jesus and speak God's Truths? Or, are we going to speak and act with abuse and violence. When we speak and act with evil, it only creates further evil. Jesus came with The Power of The Father's Love to stop all evil by giving us His Life for us. Love your enemies and pray for your persecutors. Jesus experienced and endured all evil, but Jesus never allowed the evil to pass through Him, hence, all evil died in Jesus. Jesus was never a source of evil. Jesus responded to be converted from the evil ways of a fallen and broken world, only, if we repent (stop doing evil) and believe in Jesus. Be like Jesus. Telemacus only let the Holy Spirit work in him and through him so that he could do The Will of The Father in The Name of Jesus. Let Jesus live in you so that all evil will die in you. *Pr. 

Feb. 23: Saint Polycarp, Bishop and Martyr

Undoubtedly one of the great martyr-heroes of the early Church. St. Polycarp is the first Christian martyr—after St. Stephen—of whose suffering and death we possess a complete, eye-witness account. He was possibly a disciple of the Apostle St. John himself. He became Bishop of Smyrna, and at a time of fierce persecution he was arrested, ordered to renounce his Christian faith and give divine honours to the emperor. The elderly bishop answered: 'Eighty six years have I served him (Christ) and he has done me no wrong. How can I blaspheme my king and Saviour?' He was sentenced to be burned at the stake and met his torture with great serenity and a prayer of thanksgiving on his lips. That was about A.D. 155.
