that shines in the darkness, and (Cont. from page 1) the darkness has not overcome it." Jesus Christ is the Word of God that came to offer the Light of God to all people. The Light is Holiness, which at times is referred to as the Truth, Love and Power of God that we need to be strengthened in will and desire to seek and to find God throughout this life and be converted from evil and redeemed by Jesus to enter Heaven. We can approach God only to the degree that we have allowed Him into our lives by accepting and following His Commands. The apostle John is telling us in verses #3-4, that all life comes through Jesus and no thing exists without Jesus bringing it into this life, which tells us that God wants the human person to live from the moment that he/she is created. This is the reason for the 5th Command "thou shall not kill", which prohibits the act of murdering a human being. We must respect all human life as being willed into existence by God at the moment of conception until the moment of "natural death". If we choose not to believe that it is God Who Wills humans beings into existence, then we will never understand the meaning of God's words "to the least you do to your brother (your fellow human being) you do unto me" (Mt. 25:40), and we will not have the respect to honor and defend the dignity of people from the injustices that originate from selfish human pride in the forms of lying, stealing, drunkenness, sexual immorality, sorcery or murder. Murder is the killing of innocent human beings be it at the earliest stages of life through act of abortion and embryonic stem-cell research or at the end of their lives through euthanasia or by any act of anger or hate. Actions such as these reveal the unconverted evil human nature that does not respect or defend the rights of God found by keeping His Commands which respect the inalienable rights to human life. What we do to others reveals our interior attitude toward God. If we follow "The Golden Rule", it can keep us from many types of evil, "Do unto others as you would have them do unto you." (Lk 6:31) We come from God, and may Fr. Doug Binsfeld we go to God.

St. Faustina,

From the Pastor "On Friday, after Holy Communion, I was carried in spirit before the throne of God. There I saw the heavenly Powers which continuously praise God. Beyond the throne I saw a brightness inaccessible to creatures, and there only the Incarnate Word enters as Mediator. When Jesus entered this light, I heard these words, Write

down at once what you hear: I am the Lord in My essence and am immune to orders or needs. If I call creatures into being-that is the abyss(((endless depth))) of My mercy. And at that very moment I found myself, as before, in our chapel at my kneeler, just as Mass had ended. I already had these words written." (#85, Divine Mercy in My Soul Diary)

After St. Faustina received Holy Communion at Mass, she was taken in spirit to a certain place in Heaven "beyond the throne" where no created being can enter. It is accessible only to The Divine Being Himself, as she sees Jesus, The Second Person of The Divine Trinity, entering into that particular place of Heaven. All that she observes is what she describes as a brightness of God's Divine Nature that has an intensity through which no created being can approach, and that Jesus tells her that God is not bound to any orders or needs.

With that said, we see the tender compassion of God, Who creates us out of His endless Divine Loving Mercy so that each of us might be able to experience God's Life of Love for all eternity. God calls us into existence in this world and offers each human being the opportunity of a personal relationship with Him through the Powers of Faith, Hope, and Love so that this journey through earthly life might end with the Blessedness of Eternal Life with God in Heaven. God desires that every person He creates be with Him forever. God creates us so that we may share The Joy of His Life of Love while we live on earth and one day in all its fullness eternally in Heaven.

The scripture that comes to mind is John 1:1-4 "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. (2) He was in the beginning with God. (3) All things came to be through him, and without him nothing came to be What came to be (4) through him was life, and this life was the light of the human race; (5) the light (Cont on page 4)
