physical and spiritual worlds thinned and the souls of the dead, along with goblins, witches and ghosts would come out, and summer time ended the next day on November 1st when the cold and dark of winter death began. Among the Celts was the learned class called the Druids, who governed the Celts; They were pagan priests, teachers and judges that are better known today as the builders of Stone Henge.

Part of their belief was that the light from large fires at night would drive away evil spirits because fire brought light into the darkness. In this practice, we can see that the Celts were aware of the presence of evil spirits in the world, as well as, their desire to be free from them, and this is exactly what Jesus Christ did as "The Light" that came into a dark world of sin/evil setting us free from every evil spirit by giving us The Divine Powers of Faith, Hope and Love to children of God by enlightening the darkness of our minds with the Truths of The Eternal, All-Powerful and Loving God. The pagan Celts would place an offering of food beyond the light of the fire, hoping to appease the evil spirits not to inflict evil upon them. They would put on grotesque masks and animal skulls in hopes of scaring away any evil spirits that were not interested in their offering of food, but one of the diabolic aspects of this pagan religious practice was the killing of human beings as a sacrificial offering to appease their god of the dead called Samhain.

In 43 AD, the pagan Roman Empire had conquered most of the lands of the Celts, who lived in Northern Europe, Britain and Ireland and outlawed the practice of human sacrifices. Later, in 312 AD during the Roman civil war at the battle of the Milvian Bridge near Rome, Constantine had a dream of the Cross of Jesus Christ, Whom Catholic Christians venerated, and the words came to him **'By this sign thou shalt conquer.'** Constantine had the Sign of the Cross painted upon all the shields of his soldiers, and he was victorious. Constantine became the Emperor of Rome and accepted the Catholic Faith. Emperor Constantine wrote the Edict of Milan, which granted religious tolerance to Catholic Christians, and the pagan Roman Empire stopped persecuting Catholics and accepted the Catholic Faith. Emperor Constantine also gave land to build Catholic Churches. Catholicism became the primary religious belief of Rome, although many pagan Romans, who worshipped many gods were angered by this Catholic Faith.

In the year 837 AD, Pope Gregory IV transferred the feast of All The Martyrs from May 13th to November 1st in conjunction with the Celtic new year celebration. This Christian Feast originated during the Roman persecution of Catholic Christians. There were so many Catholics martyred for their belief in Jesus Christ that they could no longer be honored individually, so the Church created a feast day to honor their faith and belief in Jesus that empowered them to be faithful to our Lord while enduring terrible persecutions; from the loss of jobs, the confiscation of finances and property, imprisonment, slavery, torture and murder. The Feast of All Martyrs was a time to pray to Jesus to gain protection from evil, as well as, a remembrance and prayers for the dead through the intercessions of the martyred saints. This part of the Catholic Christian Faith made a connection with similar beliefs already held by the pagan Celts, who feared the evil spirits and the dead. This similarity of beliefs opened the Celts to receive further teaching about The Only Begotten Son of God, our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, Who came to set us free from all evil spirits.

The night of October 31st and November 1st became known as Hallowed Eve (Hallowed = Holy and eve = evening), Holy Evening. November 2nd became known as All Souls Day, where Catholics traditionally went to the cemeteries in a special remembrance and prayer for the souls of the dead. **(Cont. on page 3)**

These traditional Catholic practices of going to the cemeteries and praying for the dead were quickly embraced by the Celts and the Druids who already had an understanding of the spirits and souls of dead. This teaching of the Catholic Faith helped to bring about the full conversion of these pagan Celt people by the faithful efforts of Catholic priests, monks, nuns and laity, who went to these pagan Celts to share The Catholic Faith with them. The Celts practiced these traditions on the eve of All Saints Day, and to light their way they lit candles placed in carved out pumpkins to protect the candles from being blown out by the wind. The pagan night of darkness and fear of evil became transformed to a Holy Night of Light and prayer to Jesus Christ for the protection from evil spirits and for the conversion of souls. Whether this day remains a Christian Holy Day in our time will depend on what we believe. Will we believe as the Christians or be afraid as the pagans?




