# Can we overcome violence with violence? A reflection on the marathon bombings.

Since the start of the trial of Dzhokhar Tsarnaev, it has been hard to read a newspaper or watch the news on TV or follow local or national news online without being drawn back into the drama and tragedy that unfolded two years ago at the Boston Marathon. We'll never forget the video footage and the photos of people who were killed or wounded. Many of us knew someone who was there, running or watching the marathon. You remember where you were when you found out it happened, much like September 11, 2001.

The news stories of trial not only brought it back but painted a much more detailed picture of the huge toll of suffering and loss that the two bombs inflicted. The victims were more than those who died or received physical injuries. They also include the families, relatives, friends, neighbors, and all those in the crowd who were shaken by the explosion and all they learned about it later. One can only imagine what has gone on in the minds and hearts of the jury and anyone in the court room. There was a part of me that simply wanted to turn the page or click the remote. Enough is enough. But there was also a part of me that needed to get closer to what it means to be human, to feel the pain of others, and by doing so to become more resolved not to inflict pain on others, and to become healers rather than executors.

There was no doubt from the beginning of the trial that Tsarnaev would be convicted of every count of killing and maiming people. The only hope of the defense is to spare his life. Everyone has an opinion about the death penalty. The facts of this case might give pause for some to ask themselves: is a case like this that rare exception to one's usual opposition to the death penalty, because the death and injury was so great and calculated to be so and because it is so clear that this young man did this?

The Church in our time, from popes to bishops, has become firmer and stronger against the death penalty. In a word, no crime warrants taking another human life. Not because there might be a doubt about the innocence or guilt of the person (in this instance, the guilt is unquestionable). But because killing one person doesn't somehow balance the scale of the killing of another or many others. Or to quote our American bishops: "When the state, in our names and with our taxes, ends a human life despite having non-lethal alternatives, it suggests that society can overcome violence with violence. The use of the death penalty ought to be abandoned not only for what it does to those who are executed, but for what it does to all of society." USCCB, *A Culture of Life and the Penalty of Death.* 

People can and do argue against the death penalty for other reasons. For instance: that the death sentence would bring forth an endless series of appeals and these appeals would not bring any closure to suffering of victims and families. Or that death could be construed by terrorists as form of martyrdom. Or that death would be too easy a way out for someone who seems not to care about living or dying.

If there was some good that came out of hearing from the witnesses and loved ones, it may be that the stories remind us of the reality of both love and evil, of the intense cruelty which one person can inflict on another and of the heroism that inspires us in the midst of tragedy. Violence in film and video games has anesthetized us to the intense pain that real human feel. These forms of "entertainment" trivialize the immensity of human suffering that killing inflicts on others and the death of the soul of the killer himself. Are young people today, immersed in a dark fantasy world of violence, losing their sensitivity to human pain? Killing has become a sport played out in any one's home on a computer. I think about school shootings. We are surrounded by this pop culture of death. We legalize ending life just as it begins, and hasten death at the other end. Do we think executing criminals will change this culture of death or will it only contribute to it?

For me, faith gives us the final word. God's word in the gospels is both mercy and judgment. Only mercy can turn hearts from violence to peace. With God's grace, in this coming holy year of mercy, we might dedicate ourselves to believing more and more in the power of mercy and forgiveness to bring an end to more violence.

Believing in God's justice helps us to realize that in the end neither execution or a life sentence in prison will bring us to our ultimate accountability. In the end, we will stand before God and face the one who knows everything about us: every act, every intention, every motive in our hearts. At that moment, when our whole truth is made known, all of us will be given a sentence or a reprieve that is not measured in years but in eternity. God alone will be the final judge and jury.
