Vocation Views

Jesus emptied Himself and became obedient even unto death. Are you willing to die to selfishness? Let Christ reign in your heart! (Philippians 26-11)



Beginning with the celebrations of Passion (Palm) Sunday the church enters a most sacred time as it reflects on the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus and the sending forth of the Holy Spirit. On Monday of Holy Week, the faithful and the priests gather with the Bishop at the Cathedral in Bismarck for the Chrism Mass when the holy oils used in the sacraments are blessed.

On Thursday evening with the beginning of the celebration of the Mass of the Lord's Supper the season of Lent ends and the Sacred Triduum begins. The Sacred Triduum consists of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday.

Holy Thursday 7:00 p.m.

On this night we remember that Jesus gathered with His disciples for what would be His "Last Supper" with them. This meal is the origin of the Eucharist and the Sacrament of Holy Orders. Part of this liturgy is the washing of the feet, a sign of humble service to each other after the manner and fashion of Jesus Christ.

Good Friday 3:00 p.m.

On Good Friday, the Passion narrative from the Gospel according to St. John is proclaimed. Following the Gospel proclamation is solemn veneration of the cross and the reception of Holy Communion with the Holy Eucharist consecrated at the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. It is a liturgy that begins and ends in silence as we commemorate the death of Jesus.

Easter Vigil 8:00 p.m.

This night is the most sacred night of the year for Christians as we commemorate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. We begin with a service of light and an extended liturgy of the Word followed by the celebration of the sacraments of initiation culminating in the celebration of the Eucharist.

Easter Sunday 8:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.

The sweet sound of "alleluia" fills the air as we gather again this day to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus. We solemnly renew our baptismal promises in the midst of this liturgy Sunday morning. Out of chaos, darkness and death Jesus stands as new life giving us hope that after every death is the promise of life.

TENEBRAE will be presented at Queen of Peace, Wednesday, April 1st at 8 pm. Tenebrae means "darkness" or "shadows" and is a Holy Week devotion. During Tenebrae we read from the book of Lamentations, a collection of poems lamenting the destruction of Jerusalem in 586 BC and its aftermath of ruin and exile. In spite of the mournful nature of most of the book, there is also a note of trust and hope in the Lord for the future. The psalms and readings are a reflection on the sufferings of Christ-in silence-for our sins. In the petitions we ask for God's mercy because of our failings, as well as praying for our needs. The last candle, symbolizing Christ, is removed for a while to remind us of his death and burial. Then it is returned to its place in anticipation of our Lord's resurrection. Everyone is invited to attend this beautiful and reflective time.
